GEOSCIENCE INFORMATION SOCIETY AWARD WINNERS FOR 2009

The following awards will be presented at the 2009 GSA Annual Meeting at the Society's Awards Reception on October 20, 2009:

Mary B. Ansari Distinguished Service Award

Recipient: Sharon Tahirkheli (Information Systems Director, American Geological Institute)

The Mary B. Ansari Distinguished Service Award recognizes significant contributions to the geoscience information profession. The award was established in 2005 through the generous support of Mary B. Ansari, Director Emerita for Branch Libraries and Administrative Services, University of Nevada-Reno and 1990 President of the Geoscience Information Society.

It is our pleasure to present the 2009 award to Sharon Tahirkheli.

For more than thirty years Sharon has been a member of the geoscience information community, starting as a GeoRef indexer and progressing to her current position as Information Systems Director of the American Geological Institute. Throughout her career she has demonstrated profound knowledge of GeoRef, the premier database of the geosciences, as well as the literature of the earth sciences and the intricacies of modern databases. She has broadened and deepened GeoRef to reflect the expanding and increasingly interdisciplinary scope of the geosciences. As a result, the user base has also expanded to include more geophysicists, climate researchers, and numerical modelers, among others. Her contributions to the Cold Regions Bibliography Project have been similarly significant and particularly important given the high interest in global climate change and melting sea ice. Under Sharon's leadership, the Arctic databases have been stabilized, historic materials added, and coverage vastly increased for current materials worldwide.

Sharon has a lengthy record of involvement in supplementary projects and initiatives. Many librarians first met Sharon in the GeoRef training sessions she ably presented at their libraries or

conferences where her effective teaching and people skills were noted. She has applied her diplomatic skills in settings such as the GeoRef Advisory Committee (GRAC) and DLESE (the Digital Library for Earth System Education), where representatives from varying constituencies often present divergent views. Her annual updates at GSIS on AGI products have been key to keeping librarians current about new features, policies, and search strategies. Attuned to financial pressures in the not-for-profit sector, Sharon has pursued moderate pricing structures, negotiated with vendors, and worked for multi-tiered pricing to enable access across a spectrum of institutional types. The author of numerous publications, she has used the literature to raise awareness of new resources and changes in the delivery of information. She has worked for the betterment of information professionals by serving on committees, organizing the 2000 GSIS conference, editing v. 31 of the Proceedings, and serving as President of the Geoscience Information Society 2001.

Sharon has played a vital role in the founding of GeoScience World (GSW). Since 2004 she has been a member of the GSW Board of Directors and the GSW Treasurer. Her foresight, collaboration and hard work in the creation of GSW are major contributions to the geoscience community. Her work has also moved GeoRef strategically into the digital future and helped anchor the resource with a new generation of users.

Sharon's people skills, technical savvy, business acumen, international aware-

ness, and wide knowledge of the geosciences continue to serve the community with exceptional skill, competence and dedication. Gracious, fully focused, and effective, Sharon provides noteworthy service to geoscientists, librarians and information specialists. It is a pleasure to present her with the Mary B. Ansari Distinguished Service Award of GSIS.

MID-YEAR REPORTS

GSIS Guidebooks Committee Midyear Report April 2009

Lura Joseph, chair of the Guidebooks Committee, spent a 6-month sabbatical (September 2008 through February 2009) identifying the gaps in indexing of guidebook series in GeoRef and the online guidebooks database (GGNAD). Of the 1067 guidebook series in the GGNAD, spreadsheets were created for approximately 800 of the series and populated with the data from the GGNAD. Approximately 300 were selected for the sabbatical project. By searching the Geo-Ref and Worldcat online databases, Lura was able to determine mutual and unique gaps in the three major indexes used to identify and locate field trip guidebooks. By searching the web pages of the various societies and surveys, additional titles were identified. This information will be provided to AGI GeoRef so that the information can eventually be added to both GeoRef and the GGNAD. The project is ongoing. Lura has submitted

a related abstract to the International Grey Literature Conference, to be held at Library of Congress in Washington, DC, in December 2009. After further work, Lura plans to write a number of articles targeting specific populations of geologists, outlining the problems related to guidebooks, and soliciting their help in preserving and indexing guidebooks.

Lura also spent two days at AGI headquarters in April learning to index guidebooks for GeoRef. Procedures are being worked out for her to begin indexing guidebooks for GeoRef on a volunteer basis. GeoRef staff has already indexed a number of the guidebooks currently on the Waiting List, and Lura should soon receive a list of completed titles to be removed from the List.

The Best Guidebook Award subcommittee chair, Erin Palmer, put out a call for nominations. Six guidebooks were nominated, and the winner has been announced. (See Best Guidbook Award article page 8)

Louise Zipp is responsible for contacting future field trip leaders, encouraging them to use the Guidelines. Her area of coverage continues to be the United States from PA to NJ and north, also Canada west through Ontario, except for Nunavut. Louise developed a list of about 60 potential field trip sponsors and has checked them all at least twice on the web. She sent out 13 emails, mostly to Canadian field trip organizers, with no responses to date. This year, her email message urges guidebook authors to submit a copy to their national library, to nearby university libraries, and to AGI for indexing in GeoRef. Many of the potential field trip sponsors have nothing posted yet, so Louise will recheck the list every few weeks. In the past, Louise has received good responses from leaders, including thanks for pointing out the Guidelines and the online database. Thelma Thompson has joined the committee and will soon select a geographic area for contacting field trip leaders.

Please remember to submit titles of new guidebooks that you receive to Lura Joseph <luraj@uiuc.edu>!! Over the past two or three years, there have been only a few individuals regularly submitting titles. We really need your help!

Treasurer's Report Summary:

During the first half of 2009, GSIS received income of \$8,614.79 and incurred expenses of \$4,743.73. There was one unanticipated expense of \$688.50 in the form of a delayed bill from GSA for services utilized by GSIS during the 2008 annual meeting. GSIS bank account balances as of June 30, 2009 were as follows: checking, \$15,947.85; money market fund, \$20,167.30; GSIS General Funds CD, \$13,653.10; Ansari Awards CD \$9,196.31 (Best Reference Award fund \$5,743.83 plus Distinguished Service Award fund \$3,452.48). The total balance in the Treasury on June 30, 2009 was \$58,964.56.
