The Social Media and Publicity Committees merged into one committee this year. GSIS Common Read Report:

The GSIS 2023 Common Read occurred on Zoom on July 31, 2023 from 2 – 3 PM EDT.

After a somewhat lengthy selection process including soliciting potential titles (many interesting titles on various geoscience and geoscience adjacent topics were suggested) and then voting on a subset of five (trying to cover a variety of areas of interest), we chose: Ice Ages: Their Social and Natural History by Allan Mazur, by popular vote.

We had some good discussion about the book but were surprised that it really did not talk about lce Ages per se. It discussed more the history of geologic history. This led to some general disappointment that the content of the book did not match the expectations from the title e.g. nothing about mammoths. Comments included that the author dwelt on subjects that are part of basic historical geology courses and some topics seemed outside what one would expect in a book on the ice ages including discussing Charles Darwin. There was comment that Allan Mazur was not from one of the traditional geoscience disciplines, but rather studies biosociology and it was thought that may be what ultimately led to the perceived disconnect. Even with the disappointments, everyone one considered it a good book, we had a good conversation, and no one regretted reading the book. Mazur, A. GSIS—**GSA** Publications Committee Report:

I was unable to attend this year's Publications Committee meeting (viewing the eclipse in Albuquerque), but here are my notes:

Publications update—Publication figures for *Geology, GSA Bulletin*, and *Geosphere* were distributed, along with impact factors. Those impact factors for 2023: *Geology* at 5.8; *GSA Bulletin* at 4.9; and *Geosphere* at 2.5. There were also status reports on GSA Books, *GeoScienceWorld* and an Open Access update. GSW now has 55 journal titles and eBook content from 14 publishers. Publication activities of note include: Reportedly, Elsevier will discontinue *Geofacets* effective December 2023. *GSA Bulletin* will go online-only in January 2024.

2025 Science Editor openings—The Committee will put out a Call for Editors shortly; all applications

must be submitted by early Spring 2024. We have 3 editor position openings for *Geology* and 1 opening for *Environmental and Engineering Geoscience*. Please spread the word.

Authorship and Artificial Intelligence Tools Policy—A proposed policy on AI was introduced, centered around disclosure of AI tools, adherence to the Committee on Publication Ethics (COPE) guidelines (https://publicationethics.org/cope-position-statements/ai-author) and guidelines on how the disclosure of AI use should be done.

Other topics included:

- GSA's proposed preprint server policy, on how submission to a preprint server impacts formal article publication.
- Recommendations on encouraging scientific or research publications on topics that are "less traditionally published in GSA science journals," for example on Diversity, Inclusion & Equity, geoheritage, and geological education.
- Publications language on ethical sampling, with the aim to consider strengthening this policy.

The GSA Publications Committee's next meeting will be in Spring 2024 (virtual). Please let me know if you have questions or concerns I can forward to Bridgette Moore at GSA. [Note: The Fall meeting is usually in-person (virtual attendance is possible but full communication is less than ideal). – Lisa Dunn, Idunn@mines.edu.

Guidebooks Committee Annual Report:

This Guidebooks Committee communicated via emails this year to introduce members to one another and outline the work we needed to accomplish. We searched through state and provincial geological surveys, professional organizations, and commercial publishers to discover newer guidebooks. We evaluated the ones we found, to determine this year's award winners. We also shared a list of these, as well as some going back to 2020, with AGI for inclusion in their Geologic Guidebooks of North American database. This collaboration is one that was picked up again this year after a hiatus over the past several years. Lastly we reviewed and suggested changes to the GSIS Handbook's excerpt on the Guidebooks Committee.


Artificial Intelligence and Librarianship - Open Textbook Library



1. **Call to order** at 3:34 EDT

2. Approval of minutes (2021 business meeting)

a. Tabled until minutes are sent out to members and approval will be done remotely.

ACTION: Jenna will send out the minutes to the membership.

3. Executive Board and Appointed Position Reports

a. Presidential report (Monica Pereira)

i.GSA and AGI continue their diversity initiatives.

• GSIS held a webinar presentation on ableism in the geological sciences on Sep. 21, 2022 (International Association for Geoscience Diversity; Anita Marshall).

ii.GSA Annual Meeting

- In general, the meeting seemed well-attended.
- Program: https://gsa.confex.com/gsa/2022AM/meetingapp.cgi/Home/0 for your review.
- COVID is alive and well, and a few members mentioned that they no longer have the funds or time to attend the GSIS meetings as they coincide with GSA.

b. Past President Report (Emily Wild)

- i.People are interested in attending this type of meeting and other learning opportunities virtually. There is great demand for our sessions, GL101 in particular, but membership remains low.
- ii.Recommends updating bylaws and ensuring we're using up-to-date materials to encourage participation.
- iii.Recommends partnering with similar organizations like ASLI (Atmospheric Sciences Librarians) and sharing membership to ensure continuity. Shaun Hardy suggested that GSIS needs to do some visioning with the membership at large to clarify the purpose of the organization.

- c. Topical Session Convener report (Lisa Dunn)
- i.GSIS did not organize a Topical Session or an exhibit at GSA 2022. This was consistent with a number of other groups similar to GSIS. Cost is a significant barrier to attendance at GSA and GSIS attendance is too low to staff booths, etc.
- ii.Lisa strongly recommends we stay affiliated with GSA and AGI but to de-emphasize presenting at GSA, focusing instead on virtual options.
- iii.Lisa participated on the joint technical program committee, which was considerable work.
- iv. Emily suggested not having a Technical Session Convenor going forward and to instead strike a committee to explore virtual options. She noted that there might be GSA and AGI affiliation requirements for tax and non-profit status reasons, but that GSIS can be an affiliate of GSA without having a Technical Convenor.

ACTION: Linda will find documents relating to GSIS' relationship with GSA and AGI on the wiki.

d. Treasurer report (Kelly Grove)

i.Update on balances:

- \$51,057.05 in checking and savings
- \$3,562.07 in the Ansari fund
- \$4,863.83 in the Best Reference funds
- \$4,696.39 in the PayPal account
- For a total of \$64,179.34

ii. This year we have spent a grand total of \$2,245.52. After subtracting money coming in from membership dues and interest from the bank we have paid \$1,070.52.

iii.We need an auditor for the 2022 books. It is preferable that this person serve a 2 year term.

iv.Request to remove the option to pay via check from the website. We get very few checks, and when we do it actually causes more problems then amount of money we get out of it.

v.GSIS goes up for reincorporation in April of 2023 (Thanks to Shaun Hardy for managing this.)

i.73 members. Down from 82 last year and 85 the year before. 12 new members in 2022. I suspect the pandemic still plays a role in our declining numbers, but it is an ongoing concern.





One of the many Halloween-themed items at the model Pittsburgh. I am not sure we ever found the zombie, though.




